LEGISLATIVE NEWS..... Tom Moscovic It's A New Year with the Same Old Stuff ! 12 Critical Issues Facing Education in 2020

Education has many critical issues; although if you watch the nightly news or a 24/7 news channel, you most likely see very little when it comes to education. Our political climate has taken over the news, and it seems as though education once again takes a back seat to important political events as well as salacious stories about reality television stars. It sometimes makes me wonder how much education is valued?

Every year around this time, I highlight some critical issues facing education. I believe we should have a critical look at the issues we face in education, and create some dialogue and action around these issues, and talk about them sooner rather than later.

Clearly, the fact that we are entering in 2020 means we need to look at some of these issues with hindsight because we have seen them before. Have the issues of the past changed or do they continue to impact our lives? As with any list, you will notice one missing that you believe should be added. Please feel free to use social media to add the ones you believe should be there.

These issues are not ranked in order of importance. I actually developed a list of 20 critical issues but want to narrow it down to 12. They range from issues that impact our lives in negative ways to issues that impact our lives in positive ways, and I wanted to provide a list of issues I feel educators will believe are in their control.

I have spent the better part of 2019 on the road traveling across the U.S., Canada, Europe, the U.K. and Australia. The issues that are highlighted below have come up in most of these countries, but they will be particularly important for those of us living in the U.S. There are a couple that seem to be specifically a U.S. issue, and that will be obvious to you when you see them.

Health & Wellness: Research shows that many of our students are stressed out, anxiety–filled, and at their breaking point. Teachers and leaders are experiencing those same issues....

Literacy: We have too many students not reading with proficiency, and therefore, at risk of missing out on the opportunity to reach their full potential....

School Leadership: Many school leaders enter into the position with high hopes of having a deep impact but are not always prepared for what they find....

Our Perception of Students: Sometimes we lower our expectations of students because of the background they come from....

Cultures of Equity: Students and the schools they attend need to be provided with equitable resources, and we know that is not happening....

District Office/Building-Level Relationships: There are too many school districts with a major disconnection between the district office and building level leaders....

Politics: It's an election year. We have to wonder how the campaigns and ultimate presidential decision will impact education because the last few education secretaries have not given us all that much to cheer about....

Our Perception of Teachers: Over the last few decades there has been a concerted effort to make teachers look as though they chose teaching because they could do nothing else. Teachers are educated, hardworking professionals who are trying to meet the academic and social-emotional needs of their students, which is not always easy....

Vaping: Vaping is a major health crisis. Reports show that there has been a major spike in the use of vaping in adolescents.

Time on Task vs. Student Engagement....It is time to focus on Student Engagement rather than Time on Task....

Teachers With Guns: Not an easy one to add to the list. More of this will be seen in 2020.

Climate Change: Young people will rise up and make climate change a critical issue in 2020.

It is always interesting to reflect on the year and begin compiling a list of critical issues. I know it can be daunting to look at, and begin to see where we fit into all of this, but I have always believed that education is about taking some of these critical issues and turning them around to make them better. Anyone who gets into teaching needs to believe that they can improve the educational experience for their students, and these are just a few places to start.

Congratulations to our Legislative Committee Chairperson <u>Tom Moscovic</u>. Tom was elected to be a delegate to the Democratic National Convention in Milwaukee in July. We wish him well in this experience.

Vaccines for Grandparents

No Staying up-to-date on our immunizations is important to most of us. If you are not up-to-date and may be spending time with a new-

born you may want to re-think that. In fact, it is not uncommon today for young and/or expectant parents to request their grandparents to update their immunizations.

Whooping cough (pertussis) is the most needed vaccine. Pertussis is a highly contagious respiratory illness that is one the rise. While people of any age can get whooping cough (hmm...think I got that shot in the '50s???), infants are especially vulnerable. They usually get their first vaccine at 2 months (if the parents agree) but are vulnerable until al least 6 months. Half of all infants who get whooping cough before 1 year of age need to be hospitalized.

Other vaccines you may want to ask your primary care practitioner about include:

- Flu Vaccine: Getting an annual flu vaccine protects you and any young children you are in contact with from serious risk.
- **Pneumonia Vaccine**: A serious health lung infection that may be caused by bacteria, virus or fungus. Adults over 65 are advised to get both the pneumococcal conjugate vaccine (CVV13) and the pneumococcal polysaccharide (PPSV23)

Shingles Vaccine: Anyone who has ever had Chicken Pox can get shingles. But the risk of shingles increases as we get older. In addition, people who have an active shingles virus can spread it to INFANTS. (not generally contagious to other adults) If you received a shingles vaccine years ago you need to get the updated vaccine. It is a series of 2 injections, 2 months apart.

If you are not sure which vaccines you should get, talk to your doctor. He or she can help you determine what is best for your health as well as the health of children you spend time with.
